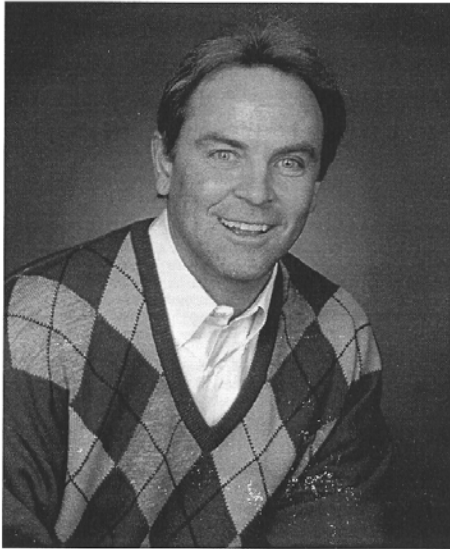

Jimmy Disbrow

July 9, 1948 – October 16, 2002

James "Jimmy" Disbrow of Minneapolis, Minn., passed away on Wednesday, Oct. 16, after a courageous four-year battle with brain cancer.

Disbrow was elected as the 24th president of the USFSA in May 1998. Prior to being elected president, Disbrow served as the Midwestern Vice President for three years and was chairperson of the USFSA's International Committee from 1993-96. In addition, Disbrow was a national-level judge who presided over seven U.S. Figure Skating Championships and served as the chief referee at the 1994 U.S. Figure Skating Championships in Detroit, Mich.

Disbrow served as the team leader for the 1998 U.S. Olympic Figure Skating Team in Nagano, Japan, and the 1995 World Championships in Birmingham, England. He also was the assistant team leader for the U.S. Team at the 1993 World Figure Skating Championships in Prague, Czech Republic. He also served as the Chair of the 1998 World Figure Skating Championships in Minneapolis.

"Jimmy Disbrow will be greatly missed by the USFSA skating family," said Phyllis Howard, USFSA president. "His passionate love of the sport, his strong commitment to the athletes, as well as his exuberant

personality will long be remembered by a wide circle of skating friends. Our thoughts and prayers are with Dede, Devon and Carl in the days ahead, but they must know that Jimmy's spirit will always remain a part of this association."

As a competitor, Disbrow participated in the U.S. Championships from 1963-68 in both singles and pairs. As a junior men's competitor, Disbrow claimed the silver medal at the 1966 U.S. Championships. Competing in the senior men's division, he placed 7th in the 1968 U.S. Championships and finished ninth in the 1967 U.S. Championships. With partner Katie Walker, he claimed the junior pairs silver medal at the 1967 U.S. Championships.

Disbrow also had a distinguished business career, serving as the founder and chairman of the Minneapolis-based Buffalo Wild Wings, Inc. Disbrow, along with his partner and brother Scott Lowery, started Buffalo Wild Wings (then known as "bw-3") in Columbus, Ohio in 1982 and grew the company to 183 locations and served as President and CEO until 1994. He served as Chairman of the company until his death.

Survived by his loving wife, Dede, and devoted children, Carl Hensel, Devon Hensel and her husband Brandon Sorge, and a large extended family, Jimmy was a congenial man whose electric personality would light up a room. People were drawn to his warmth and compassion. Jimmy knew no strangers and touched the lives of every person that he met. He was fiercely devoted to his family, dividing time between his son's high school hockey games and traveling the world to watch his daughter's skating competitions. Jimmy cherished every relationship with his friends. No matter how successful Jimmy became, he was never too busy to stop and chat, every single morning, with every single employee in his office. He will always be remembered for his genuine interest in people, his loyalty and his seemingly endless benevolence. To his family, friends and all who knew him, Jimmy's zest for life was truly proof of the unbreakable human spirit.

1998 Worlds Volunteer - Copy Center, 1999 Co-Chair of the USFSA Judges School, 2000 World Synchronized Team Skating Championships Volunteer – Copy Center, 2002 Nationals Volunteer – Copy Center, 2002 USFSA Governing Council Volunteer, 2002 Chair of USFSA Judges School, TCFSA secretary for the past three years, headed bid committee for 2006 Nationals, USFSA Silver Test Judge and is trial judging for Synchronized Team Skating, Novice Competition and Gold Test, Member of the USFSA Memorial Fund Committee and the USFSA State Games Committee

Elizabeth volunteers every opportunity she gets and goes about her duties in a very caring and unassuming way. Elizabeth is always looking out for the best interest of the figure skating community.

GERRY MCKUSICK

A member of the Rochester Skating Club. Gerry has been a pillar in her club since 1993. She has held the office of President, Secretary and Treasurer. She has served on the Ice and Rules Committee. She has been Test Chairman. She has co-chaired the annual ice show, keeper of the ice show database, worked on the budget, costumes, pictures and advertising. Most recently, Gerry

co-chaired the Minnesota State Competition held in Rochester just a couple of weeks ago.

Her club's nomination letter states that Gerry promotes her club and the sport of figure skating every possible chance she gets. Gerry's only reimbursement is in seeing that the events and activities are done in the best possible way.

CHIP RAUTH

A member of the Figure Skating Club of Bloomington, it is safe to say that there isn't a competition chair anywhere who doesn't know of Chip Rauth!

He is the National Chair of the USFSA Music Committee. He spends countless weekends providing music for all the local non-qualifying competitions and qualifying regional, sectional, national and international competitions.

All events get the same care from Chip, whether it is a small local competition or a world class event. He has earned much respect and admiration for his expertise and for his willingness to help.

ANNE KLEIN

Is this year's recipient of
The Champion For Skating Award.

I had a chance to sit down with Anne a couple of weeks ago. Anne shared with me, how at four years old, she started skating on blades that were simply attached to a pair of shoes. The skating structure was quite different then. No free skating tests were taken until after the skater passed the 6th Figure test. Well, Anne passed her 6th test, but by that time she was in high school and was involved in other activities and did not go any further with her skating. She did, however, begin trial judging while still in high school.

After high school, Anne attended St. Catherine's and was graduated with a bachelor Of science degree in Speech/Drama/Music. It was while at St. Kate's that she met her husband, Dick. Later she and Dick married and raised three children, two sons and one daughter. When her daughter began skating, Anne found herself back in the world of figure skating and she's been involved ever since.

In 1978, Anne received her first appointment as a USFSA test judge. At the present time, she is a Gold Test Judge and Junior Competition Judge. She has judged numerous Regional Sectional and National competitions. The USFSA soon realized that Anne possessed the qualities it needed for the work that had to be done on the national level.

Nationally, Anne has been

- A member of the USFSA Board of Directors as Midwest Vice President.
- Chair of the Protocol Committee – which led her into working with the ISU dignitaries at 1998 Worlds.
- She has been Vice Chair of the Singles and Pairs Test Committee.

- She was Chair of the Member Recognition Committee.
- Finally, she has been a USFSA Team Leader of the singles, pairs and dance skaters as they compete around the world.

Locally, Anne has

- Been LOC Chair of the 1991 National held at the Target Center
- Given countless hours as a Gold Judge at our local test sessions.
- Served as President of the Minnesota Skating Scholarship Committee for five years.

In her spare time, Ann has been active in her church, enjoys traveling, is involved with the St. Kate's Almae Association, and is a proud grandmother of eight. She manages to regularly attend classes at the University of Minnesota, for mental exercise, and can be found at the Marsh for physical exercise.

Anne is a dedicated judge, a tremendous asset to the sport of figure skating, a very hard working supporter, not only in our community, but also across the nation and the world. She is very sophisticated, humble, well-spoken, highly-respected, and very deserving of this award.

Acceptance Remarks by Recipient, Anne Klein

A very wise man once gave me some very sage advice. "When giving a speech," he suggested, "be prepared, be brief and be off!" I will try to do so.

My skating career began at an arena on Portland Avenue, home of the FSC of Minneapolis. There were only two clubs at that time, the other being the St. Paul FSC. My parents, my three siblings and I skated in the annual ice show. One year, the guest star was Sonja Henie and she stayed for a week at my parents' home. However, I never met her as it was before I was born. Talk about ancient history!

I continued skating through high school and began my trial judging then. Although I've had the pleasure of participating in many areas of the sport, the longest has been as a judge. It has been, at various times, frustrating, strenuous, exhausting, stimulating, exciting and great fun with more than a few laughs thrown in.

In earlier days, non-qualifying competitions were very casual. At one of them, a judge, who shall forever remain nameless, at the end of an event, made a paper airplane out of his judging sheet and sailed it into the accounting room! I don't have any information as to how the startled accountant reacted.

At a competition in Colorado, one of the doors at a corner of the rink was left open. A very competent skater performed her double lutz, right out the door, turned around, and came back onto the ice and continued her program as though nothing unusual had happened. However, she may have had the discipline to continue without skipping a beat, but not the judge sitting next to me – and me. We got the giggles – and we couldn't stop! I suppose we had had several days of judging and were overly tired. Needless to say, we got many dirty looks from the referee. Did the skater notice? Probably not – but I bet her coach did!

But the one event that makes me smile whenever I am reminded of it happened in Chicago. In the middle of a free skating program, the skater's tape broke. The disciplined competitor, skating to a selection from the Nutcracker Suite, went right on – and so did the panel of judges. Being familiar with that piece of music, we just hummed along in our best soprano, alto, tenor and bass voices. Luckily, the referee did not ask for a critique – of either our judging or our singing.

When I received the letter informing me of this honor, all sorts of clichés went through my mind: *Tickled pink! Happy as a clam! Etc.* But, it goes much deeper than that. To be associated for so many years with the sport of figure skating in the Twin Cities has been more than rewarding. The support we have for each other and, especially for the athletes so well represented here tonight by the winners of Minnesota State, is a tribute to all of you. The real champions are the skaters, coaches, parents, officials and others who, over the years, have made our community one of the best in the world of figure skating. Would you please applaud for yourselves.

But, my longest and most important support has come from my husband, Dick, who has suffered through all my travels, trials and tribulations with unceasing good humor. Dick, would you please stand?

Now, as a judge, I'm not saying that I can be bribed at some early morning test sessions, but one chocolate covered caramel does wonders for my disposition!

After the Champions' recognition, Larson presented a \$5,000 check to the Minnesota Skating Scholarship, from the Twin City Figure Skating Association.

Accepting on the Scholarship's behalf, Herb Morgenthaler noted that more than \$90,000 in scholarships has been awarded since the Scholarship's inception in 1991. Next year, the total will probably go over \$100,000. As testimony to the Scholarship's importance to area skaters, Morgenthaler read a letter of appreciation from a local senior test skater and scholarship recipient.

The TCFSA 2002 Academic Scholarship was awarded to Maria Sieve.

The evening's climax was the presentation of The Champion For Figure Skating Trophy. Nominees included Elizabeth Harty, Gerri McCusick, Chip Rauth and Anne Klein, with the trophy going to Anne. The presentation and acceptance of the Trophy are covered elsewhere in the *Rink Link*.

The Professional Skaters Association (PSA) is the organization of teaching and performing skating professionals, which provides and promotes the education and certification of figure skating coaches. The USFSA recognizes the PSA as the official coaches education, certification and training program.

The PSA offers ratings exams as a way of certifying coaches. After beginning with a basic written exam, oral ratings are offered in 10 disciplines: Moves In The Field, Free Skating, Figures, Dance, Free Dance, Pairs, Group, Program Director, Choreography & Style, and Synchronized Team. Each discipline has four levels of ratings: Registered, Certified, Senior, & Master. For each exam coaches answer questions put forth by three Master rated coaches. Coaches must pass the exam by at least two of the three examiners (just like a figure skating test!). The following TCFSA coaches recently passed exams:
